The beginning of 2021 again saw us in the grip of another national lockdown due to the Covid crisis, but at least, like other sports, we were operating and, in our case, racing.

Similar to 2020, the majority of tracks persevered and adapted to a lack of spectators and some even managed to buck-the-trend and saw an increase in foot fall, especially after late June, when unrestricted crowds were again permitted at stadia.

A review of the Greyhound Commitment and our third year in our reporting back to Defra and publication of our annual track injuries and retirement, (please see the CEO update for further details), led our Board to consider how we might take our sport's commitment to welfare even further than we had to-date. We always knew that we wanted to look at the welfare and care of our greyhounds beyond simply their racing years and to ethically look at what responsible greyhound ownership means, together with what GBGB, as the regulator, could do on a 'shared responsibility' basis.

As a result of these deliberations, in 2021 we welcomed Professor Madeleine Campbell and Angela Smith to the main GBGB Board as Independent Non-Executive Directors. Madeleine, who is an EBVS® European Veterinary Specialist and RCVS Specialist in Animal Welfare Science, Ethics and Law, was specifically recruited to chair the GBGB Welfare and Veterinary Standing Committee and to develop a new, over-arching welfare strategy on behalf of GBGB. The Strategy is due for publication in 2022.

Angela is a former Labour politician, who served as MP for Penistone and Stocksbridge from 2010 to 2019 and MP for Sheffield Hillsborough from 2005 to 2010. Angela was also a member of the EFRA Committee and helped oversee the EFRA Committee review into Greyhound Welfare in 2015-16.

The continued hard work and development of our welfare standards and commitment were somewhat overshadowed in November 2021, when we were invited to meet with the Chief Executives of the Dogs Trust and RSPCA, who outlined that they were about to embark on their own review of greyhound racing. They would specifically be looking at whether they would continue to support the sport as they previously had done or whether they would change their position. Both animal welfare charities explained that any review would be based on evidence to support their position, whatever that might eventually become.

At the point of the writing of this update, the charities have not yet reported back on their conclusions.

GBGB are, however, resolute in our mission to improve the welfare standards of the greyhounds in our care and will continue to work with any and all animal welfare charities that share that same commitment to our racing greyhounds.

Chief Executive's Report



Racing

Towcester Stadium successfully bid on hosting the English Greyhound Derby in 2021, with the final being run on 10th July. The Derby had previously been run at Towcester in 2017 and 2018 under Lord Hesketh's reign but for 2021 it was under the leadership of Kevin Boothby that we saw the Derby return to Towcester.

It was also the first time since Covid that we saw crowds return to watch the Derby – albeit on a restricted basis. With increased prize money of £175,000 for the winner, the draw for owners and trainers to apply to the competition was obvious.

The thrilling final saw a fantastic one and two win for Towcester Professional Trainer Patrick Janssens, with *Thorn Falcon* coming in as the winner, and kennelmate, *Kilara Lion* running in second, pipping Pat Buckley's former 2020 Derby winner, *Deerjet Sydney* into third place.

Signet Ace, trained by Kevin Hutton, was another major star of the track in 2021 with his GBGB Category One successes numbering the Arena Racing Company Eclipse at Nottingham along with the Arc Select Stakes and Ladbrokes Winter Derby at Monmore.

Welfare and Integrity

Our yearly published track injury and retirement data continued to demonstrate a commitment to pushing down unnecessary euthanasia's. In 2019, GBGB set itself two challenging targets to be achieved within the following three years. The targets used the 2018 data as their baseline.

The data for 2021, which represents Year 3, shows that GBGB has met both targets:

 To halve, by the end of 2021, the number of greyhounds put to sleep because of the high cost of treatment or because no home could be found. In 2018, this figure was 180 and in 2021, just nine greyhounds were put to sleep for this reason with none put to sleep because no home could be found. This is a decrease of 95% - significantly higher than the 50% target. GBGB's ultimate aim is to bring this figure down to zero.

 To halve, by the end of 2021, the number of greyhounds being put to sleep on humane grounds at the track due to injuries. In 2018, this figure was 242 and in 2021 it was 120 – a decrease of 50%. This is a fatality rate of 0.03% down from 0.06% in 2020.

Whilst not a target per se, the GBGB also committed to drive down the unnecessary numbers of deaths due to greyhounds being classified as unsuitable for homing. In 2018, this figure was 190 and in 2021, this figure was down to 13 – a reduction of 93%.

In September, we marked the first year anniversary of the Greyhound Retirement Scheme. In its first year, nearly 9,000 greyhounds were registered under the scheme and 3,000 greyhounds received the £400 GRS bond as they moved into one of 126 approved homing centres upon retirement. Overall, over £1 million was paid out to approved homing centres to help cover the costs of the greyhounds' stay with them with an additional £25,000 paid out in grants to help make improvements at the centres.

Finally, GBGB successfully maintained its UKAS accredited status for the inspection and licensing of racecourses. Since first gaining accreditation in 2010, GBGB continued to demonstrate to UKAS that the mechanism it has in place for inspections and licensing of racecourses is operated in a consistent and impartial manner and hence is compliant with all clauses of the international standard ISO17065.

The Towcester and Henlow promoter returned the English Greyhound Derby to Towcester in 2021, staging a successful Star Sports/TRC-backed Classic at the Northamptonshire venue, despite the pressures brought about by the Covid-19 pandemic.

He also announced during 2021 plans to reopen the track at Mildenhall, renamed Suffolk Downs, which staged its first meeting earlier this year, and to return greyhound racing to Oxford for the first time since 2012 - the Cowley track has already staged speedway meetings in 2022.

Regulatory Review

Introduction

2021 saw a greater lifting of COVID restrictions within the UK and a return to a more established and familiar race and competition schedule in front of a returning public. However, as the racing returned, the generation old presence of on-course layers did not with The Starting Price Regulatory Commission supporting the use of industry prices to determine SPs for greyhound racing. Mark Bird became GBGB Chief Executive, with Philip Law assuming the vacated role of Director of Regulation.

Complaints

A total of 36 complaints were received in 2021. Each complaint was investigated by GBGB staff resulting in 1 training licence being suspended, 3 independent disciplinary committee hearings, 5 local inquiries, 3 advisory and 2 improvement notices being issued.

96 screening positives were reported from POR samples, with the main screen findings being for beta/dexamethasone, nandrolone (and metabolites) and methylprednisolone.





Welfare Report

Welfare

Despite COVID restrictions remaining in place for the majority of 2021, greyhound racing continued throughout this period, albeit through a mixture of behind closed doors or with limited public attendance. Despite this, welfare initiatives within the industry kept moving forward. The introduction of an Air Conditioning Policy was one such initiative whereby the industry committed to the mandatory use of air-conditioned vehicles only from April 2023. To support trainers in meeting this new requirement, additional funding was made available through the Trainers Assistance Fund for the purchase of replacement vehicles or to upgrade existing transport arrangements.

Dr Peter Webbon, GBGB Independent Welfare Director, stood down in July 2021 and was succeeded by Professor Madeleine Campbell, European Veterinary Specialist and RCVS Specialist in Animal Welfare Science, Ethics. Professor Campbell set out immediately to establish a Welfare Strategy for greyhounds. The Strategy when released will be a public facing document on how the greyhound industry conceptualises and delivers good welfare and a good life for all greyhounds, while underwriting and safeguarding a greyhound's welfare. The Strategy is to cover all phases of a greyhound's life.

Track safety was bolstered with the appointment of Mark Peacock as GBGB Track Safety Officer. With a wealth of knowledge gained through his previous positions within the horse racing industry, Mark's appointment has added an additional level of expertise to racecourse preparation and will work alongside racecourse management and the Sports Turf Research Institute to ensure that all tracks are prepared in accordance with best practice.

GBGB's routine inspections of trainer's residential kennels was strengthened through the appointment of an independent company to conduct the annual licence certification inspection at each trainer's kennel. Based upon the standards set by the British Standards Institute's PAS 251 standard: "Specification for Greyhound Trainer's Residential Kennel". This is an additional inspection to the routine visits conducted by Stipendiary Stewards and veterinarians.

Kennel Improvement Programme

The Trainers Assistance Fund continued to support development and improvements to residential kennels and expanded its funding to include all category of trainers. £418,000 in development and improvement grants was awarded to 102 trainers.

Injury and Retirement Data

Injury data remained consistent with previous years, however, the positive effect of the Injury Recovery Scheme and additional racecourse initiatives to provide support to injured greyhounds, resulted in trackside euthanasia being reduced by 50%. Retirement data remained stable in 2021 in comparison with the record high of 2020, and the total percentage of greyhounds homed following the end of their racing career was a pleasing 94.4%.

Racing Review

GREYHOUND RACING rose to the challenge a backdrop of Covid-19 brought to the sport in 2021 by staging almost a complete programme of major events as stakeholders pulled together to produce another year full of top-class racing, significant achievements and, in the shape of Thorn Falcon and Kilara Lion, a magnificent home-trained 1-2 in the Star Sports/TRC Events & Leisure English Greyhound Derby Final at Towcester.

The Northamptonshire venue had picked up the mantle from Nottingham, and a behind-closed-doors October 2020 staging of the famous race due to the restrictions, and vowed to stage the best Classic possible in the circumstances - and did not disappoint.

Despite initial scheduling issues, a £175,000-to-the-winner showpiece was mapped out by promoter Kevin Boothby and, despite another powerful Irish challenge following a 1-2-3 for the Emerald Isle in successive English Derbys at Nottingham, history was made in the 2021 decider as Patrick Janssens enjoyed the most spectacular of successes as England wrestled the famous trophy back from Ireland on a heady night at Towcester.

Janssens had taken the champion trainer's title from his great friend and former boss Mark Wallis and now scored a remarkable one-two in the English Greyhound Derby Final as Thorn Falcon led home kennelmate Kilara Lion, the winner adding to his KAB Maiden Derby victory over C&D for the trainer and his proud owners Keith Allsop, Mark Harrison and Chris Osborn - known as Two Dragons And A Lion.

Thorn Falcon's success also made it three English-trained winners in Derbys staged at Towcester following success for Seamus Cahill's Astute Missile (2017) and Kevin Hutton's Dorotas Wildcat (2018), the new champion's sire, before the competition switched to Nottingham in the years after Towcester was shut before its much-lauded reopening.

That, plus increasing the Derby first prize to £175,000, and the intention to reopen the tracks at Mildenhall (renamed Suffolk Downs) and Oxford, shut since 2012, saw promoter Kevin Boothby handed the GWA Services to Greyhound Racing Award at the subsequent GBGB Greyhound of the Year Awards, at which Maurice Newman received a Special Recognition Award from the GWA for his years of fundraising for the Great Ormond Street Hospital Children's Charity (GOSH). Maurice sadly died in December 2022.

As for trainer Janssens, his Derby one-two matched the feat of Jim Hookway, with Tric Trac and Spectre II at White City in 1967, and Arthur Hitch, with Tico and Master Hardy at Wimbledon in 1986. A magnificent achievement for Belgium-born Janssens, the feat was applauded by Derby sponsor Ben Keith of Star Sports.





As for trainer Janssens, his Derby one-two matched the feat of Jim Hookway, with Tric Trac and Spectre II at White City in 1967, and Arthur Hitch, with Tico and Master Hardy at Wimbledon in 1986.

He said: "I'm delighted Patrick is breaking these records. When I was a bookmaker at Walthamstow, Patrick was a kennelhand with Mark Wallis and you knew then he'd become a top-class trainer in his own right one day. He's a man with a massive heart, a real gentlemen, and I congratulate him and his team."

Signet Ace was another major star of the track in 2021 with a trio of GBGB Category One successes in the Arena Racing Company Eclipse and Arc Select Stakes, both at Nottingham, plus the Ladbrokes Winter Derby at Monmore. Trained by Kevin Hutton and part-owned by the handler along with Mark Gilbert, Signet Ace - subsequently named Greyhound of the Year - was also a major reason why Hutton won the first Arc/Entain Trainers' Judgement Night at Colwick Park, scoring maximum points for the kennel.

However, with normal service resumed, Mark Wallis was crowned Ladbrokes Trainer of the Year in 2021 for a record 12th time - with the boss of Imperial Kennels regaining the title from Patrick Janssens, the 2020 champion. Wallis finished 2021 with 1,346 points, 359 points clear of Janssens (987) and ahead of Kevin Hutton (897), David Mullins (713), Angela Harrison (608) and Liz McNair (498). The top six qualified for Trainers' Judgement Night at Nottingham.

A twelfth success extended Wallis's lead over nearest rivals for Trainer of the Year titles in Linda Mullins (seven titles), John McGee (five) and Charlie Lister (four) and Wallis praised the staff at Imperial Kennels for making it possible after another successful year for his team, having sent out the winners of six GBGB Category One events.

Aayamza Royale was the kennel's major star after successfully defending her Ladbrokes TV Trophy at Monmore having also won the Coral Regency win at Hove, while there were GBGB Category One wins in 2021 for the Wallis-trained Antiqua Romeo in the Coral Essex Vase, Antiqua Storm in the BresBet East Anglian Derby at Yarmouth, Bo Shine Bullet in the Ladbrokes Kent St Leger at Crayford and Drumcrow Brent in the Coral Sussex Cup.

Coral Owners of the Year for a seventh time were the KSS Syndicate, led by Brendan Keogh and Simon Senyk, with their team of greyhounds, trained by Liz and Rab McNair from their base in Ashford, Kent, amassing 501 points, finishing ahead of Amanda Jeal (333) and the Ayamzaboys Syndicate (297). Havana Class, an 11-time winner in 2021, top-scored for them after victory in the Arc Laurels at Perry Barr as well as finishing second in the M Lambe Birmingham Cup to Carol Weatherall's Candy Man over the same C&D.

Warzone Tom was another GBGB Category One winner for the kennel with victory in the Ladbrokes Gold Collar at Crayford, while the McNairs' team of British-bred Kings and Queens out of the likes of Skate On and Queen Asia scored major wins with the likes of King Louis in the BGBF British Breeders Stakes Final at Nottingham and King Sam in the BGBF British Bred Midland Sprint Trophy.

Seamus Cahill's Pocket Lola won the British-bred showpiece in the 75th Produce Stakes at Swindon, while Kevin Hutton's Forest Natalee was named GBGB Best Dam of British Bred 2021 given this brilliant and Classic-winning bitch on the track turned super-dam in the paddocks, throwing the likes of Signet Denver, Moments of Magic, Sleek By Design and Signet Otis in her January 2020 batch by Magical Bale, while another major contributor was Bernard (May 2019 by Droopys Jet).

There was an Irish winner of the Arena Racing Company Oaks at Perry Barr as the Kennedy-family owned Billys Diva came again to deny the game Ritzy Lady (Jim Reynolds) in the bitches' Classic final; Crossfield Dusty proved himself the UK's best sprinter with wins in the Arena Racing Company Scurry at Perry Barr and Arena Racing Company National Sprint at Nottingham, while a new staying sensation emerged in the shape of Space Jet, a brilliant track record-breaking winner of the Arena Racing Company St Leger at Perry Barr for Matt Dartnall.

Other big-race winners deserving of special mention included TRC Health + Hygiene Blue Riband champion Kilara Lion (Patrick Janssens), the subsequent Derby second; Jaguar Macie (Graham Rankin), who struck in both the Ladbrokes Puppy Derby at Monmore and Arena Racing Company Puppy Derby at Newcastle and Brookside Richie (David Mullins), another two-time GBGB Category One champion in the Stadium Bookmakers Juvenile Classic at Towcester and Coral Puppy Cup at Romford.

Ricky Holloway-trained runners dominated the hurdles scene with Meenagh Maverick winning the RPGTV Grand National at Central Park and kennelmates Nomansland Flyer (Chief Ramsbottom Hurdle, Kent National Hurdle) and Toolmaker Daddy (Arena Racing Company Champion Hurdle) also major winners, while Droopys Rex completed a six-timer in winning the novice hurdlers' championship, the Cearnsport 2021 Springbok for David Mullins.


